Justice has seen to be done in Beckton after offenders tidied up an area chosen by a Neighbourhood Watch group.

Residents complained to members of the Neighbourhood Watch group that the car park in Boulwood Road was an eyesore.

The car park is privately owned but shared amongst ten people who

have failed to keep the car park neat and tidy. As a result, it has become overgrown and a dumping ground for illegal fly tips.

A team of offenders serving their Community Order tidied up the car park by removing weeds and cutting back overgrowth thanks to a scheme called Community Payback.

Community Payback is a partnership

between Newham Council, the Metropolitan Police and Probation Services. Low-risk offenders, serve sentences that repay local communities as part of their punishment.

As In Focus was going to print, the council ordered the owners of the car park to get rid of the fly tips. The owners have 28 days to clear the rubbish or face enforcement action.
